Research Activities

- All Science departments are equipped with basic Research facility.
- In addition to this, the Department of Geography and Physics has a separate laboratories worth Rs.5,00,000/- and Rs. 3,00,000/- respectively.
- Lab-based departments are equipped with computers to facilitate better quality research.
- The library is continuously enriched with new edition books and journals related to emerging trends in various subjects.
- Teachers are engaged themselves with Minor Research Projects.

Extension Activities

- The college carries out extension activities through NSS units.
- There is a Cultural Sub-Committee through which various competitions have been organized for the students.
- There exists a Departmental Sub-Committee who looks after the writing skill of the students through wall magazine.
- Students also participated in Youth Parliament Competition organized by the Government of West Bengal.

1.1.3. What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The goals and objectives of the institution address the following major considerations:

a. Intellectual academic & training

- The college offers as many as 18 subjects for the intellectual development of the students.
- Revamping of the curriculum and the examination system is done in accordance with the broader objectives of the internal quality of the students through feedback system.
- Well equipped laboratories have been set up for all five lab-based subjects to train the students in the practical base.
- Job training and Counseling work in various subjects help to improve the skills of students.

b. Access to the disadvantaged & equity

- Purulia district of West Bengal is a socially and economically underdeveloped region. Considering this, preference is given in admissions to marginalized groups such as tribal and others who belong to the backward castes.
- Equity and equality is achieved by admitting students following the norms of reservation laid down by the government of West Bengal.

c. Self development/Community - National development/Ecology & environment

- Self development is carried out through activities which are related to the curriculum as well as co-curricular activities.
- Community services are carried out through NSS.
- Women's Cell is entrusted with looking after the specific needs and guidance of female students.
- Career Counseling and Placement Cell is entrusted with the responsibility of providing opportunity to the students for employment through interface with various companies.
- Counseling and guidance for students is done by Admission Sub-committee and Career Counseling Cell and by involving students in various activities.

d. Value orientation/employment/ICT introduction and Global demand

- To make the students employable, computer is being introduced in most of the subjects. Computers with internet facility have been made available in most of the departments and library.
- The curriculum is updated keeping in mind the multi-skill development so that the students become component to meet the global demands.
- Environmental studies have been made a compulsory paper for all the students of Part III at the UG level.

1.1.4. Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The curricula of the courses offered by the college strive to address the needs of the society, and the regional and national developmental needs:

- All the subjects aim at the overall development of the students with specific importance to employability.
- A lab has been set up for each lab-oriented subject to improve the skills of the students to meet the national and international demands.
- Computers have been introduced to foster employment opportunities at all levels.

- Field trips are compulsory components Geography to make the students more aware with local, regional and special issues.
- Women related topics have been in the curriculum of some subjects like in English, Political Science etc. to create more awareness on these issues among the students.
- The course content in traditional subjects is designed in such a way that UG students can opt for higher studies either in the same subject or in allied subjects.
- The environmental studies create awareness about issues like pollution, global warming, sustainable development & conservation of natural resources among the Student Community.

1.1.5. How does the Institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

The curricula of all the courses have been revamped by the SKB University to which our college is affiliated with to incorporate new topics by referring to the curriculum of leading universities and colleges in India so as to keep our students at par with their national counterparts and to develop global competency:

- Keeping in mind the diversifying global scenario, multi-disciplinary courses like various topics for different subjects have been introduced at UG level.
- GIS Lab has been established with an investment of Rs 6,00,000/- to promote competency in the field.
- 37.5 % of all the UG courses (Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Geography, Music and Physical Education) have focused on experiential learning through laboratories, field survey and educational excursions.
- 100% students have participated in project/practical/field trip for environmental studies at the Part III.
- 100% Regular courses (Geography) have compulsory field trip and/or Institutional visits.
- Papers like Environmental Studies, Bengali and English are mandatory for all the students of Part-III & Part-I respectively.
- Due respect is given to the festivals of other faith to uphold the values of secularism of our country.
- NSS is actively involved in promoting the spirit of brotherhood, social relationship and Patriotism.
- Patriotic song competition is organised by the college every year before the Independence Day.
- College Annual Day is celebrated to promote excellence in academics.
- College Day (26th September) are celebrated to inform the students about the traditions of the college and to inculcate the values which guide us.

- The College has no Board of Studies though some teachers are members of it for BoS of the SKB University. Dr. Kshirod Chandra Mahato (Bengali), Dr. Suvranshu Pan

(Economics), Sri Subrata Duary (Philosophy) and Smt Sumantra Chakrabarty (Sociology) are members of Board of Studies of respective department of SKBU.

- The curriculum of other universities is also referred to; to ensure the currency and relevance of the programme offerings.
- Efforts are taken to include basic concepts, current and relevant topics, and stake-holder needs in the syllabi of all courses.

1.1.7. Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? The curriculum development process consists of the following stages:

Designing the draft curriculum:

- Members of Boards of Studies drafted after receiving the feedback from the stake holders of higher education namely the students, employers, alumni and academic peers. The current needs of the industry and society are assessed and the draft curriculum is designed by the head and faculty members of the respective departments.
- The draft curriculum is placed before the Board of Studies of the University for discussion / revision. Suggestions and recommendations are revised and after incorporated due consideration and placed to college authorities for application.

Review and Approval:

- A copy of the curriculum is placed before the Teachers' Council which gives the final approval.

Implementation:

- A resolution is passed by the Teachers' Council and the new/revised curriculum is implemented in the forthcoming academic year.

1.1.8. How does institution analyse/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The institution involves internal and external academic expertise in Curriculum development process by including them in the Board of Studies and Teachers' Council which are statutory bodies that are responsible for the Curriculum development process:

- Some of our college teachers are member of Board of Studies of SKB University in various departments as representative for suggestions in the framing or redesigning of the curriculum.
- The new/revised curriculum is then placed before the Teachers' Council for final approval and send to Governing Body for final approval. Teachers' Council comprises all the teachers of the college.
- The Governing Body is comprised of the Teacher-in-Charge, three nominated senior teachers of the college, two office staffs, one student member, three nominees of university and one member nominated by the DPI, Government of West Bengal.
- The restructured curricula of some of the courses reflect the global trends in higher education and develop global competency among the students to get employment opportunities. Some of the advanced topics incorporated in various subjects are listed below:

- The cut-off marks for admission Honours Courses and General Courses in UG level are 45 % and 30% respectively at Higher Secondary Examination (10 +2 level).

No, there is not any self finance programmes in this college right now.

No, the college does not provide any skill oriented programmes.

The college does not offer any distance mode of education for students, therefore conventional and distant education flexibility is not provided by the college.

The College is bound to follow the stipulations of SKB University since it is affiliated with it:

- As per the stipulations of SKB University a student who opts for three years honours programme must also opt for two subsidiary subjects and two language subjects for first year. In the second year, he/she has to complete two honours papers and two general papers. In the final year he/she in addition to the four honours subjects must take a compulsory subject on Environmental Studies. For general courses students have to clear one paper of their elective three subjects and the compulsory environmental studies too. The student takes a total of 8 honours papers, 4 subsidiary papers, 2 language papers and one EVS paper.
- The university continues to follow the annual system of examination (1+1+1 system in Part-I, Part-II and Part-III).
- A student still continues to opt for one honours subject, two (for honours) or four (for general) subsidiary subjects, two language subjects and the mandatory EVS.
- A student's performance is now evaluated over three parts, each of one year duration.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1. Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

Following University's Curriculum, the college frequently discusses about the syllabus and revision depends upon the received feedback as well as the teachers' analysis which varies from department to department. The Teachers' Council meets before the beginning of a session. The revised / modified formation and decisions must be placed before the Governing Body by the Teachers' Council for final approval and implementation. No revision is made in the middle of an academic year.

1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

Once a new course is conceptualized it takes about two years to implement it. If a course is conceptualized by a department, the following process is to be followed:

- Permission of the Teacher-in-Charge
- Placement of the proposal in the Teachers' Council for approval
- Approval of the Governing Body
- Permission from the university
- Permission from the Higher Education Council, Government of West Bengal.

Along with it, the following have to be considered:

- Involvement of infrastructure
- Involvement of finance
- Availability of faculty / recruitment of faculty
- Availability of Books in the Library

Under all circumstances the course must start in the month of July to match with the new academic session.

1.3.3. Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc. into the curriculum?

The college offers Environmental Studies to all students of Part III as per guidelines of the University. This provides knowledge about environmental issues like climate change and needs of environmental education. Besides various subjects like Economics, Sociology, Geography highlighted the issues of gender and human rights.

1.3.4. What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offer to ensure holistic development of students?

All the UG departments follow the UGC model syllabus and guidelines while developing and restructuring the curriculum as suggested by the University. The various departments organize national/regional level workshops and seminars to enrich holistic development of students which

also follow the moral and ethical values, employable and life skills, better career options and community orientation throughout various courses offered by the college and implemented through class teaching.

1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The curriculum in each department is updated according to the emerging trends in academics - nationally and globally. The institution has ensured that the curriculum has topics related to national development. New and emerging topics have been Chosen to make the students aware of the current issues related to the country. This is suitably illustrated in the activities of the following subjects:

1.3.6. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The college has started the following inter-disciplinary courses during the last five years to make the students nationally and internationally competent:

- The College organizes Seminars and Workshops choosing topics in which most of the departments can participate.

- The curriculum is revamped based on the feedback of all stakeholders of higher education and by referring to the curricula of the courses of leading Indian and international universities and other autonomous colleges to keep abreast with emerging needs.
- Courses have undergone major revision in the last year based on the feedback of stakeholders. New courses have been introduced with new topics of inter-disciplinary nature on the basis of emerging trends.

1.4.Feedback System

1.4.1. What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the university?

- At the time of admission a science student may opt for either arts or science, and a commerce student may opt for arts. However an arts student is not allowed to opt for science. Some flexibility is allowed in vocational subjects following 10% students to be admitted as per norms of the Government of West Bengal. No flexibility is provided to students regarding change of discipline or subject after the completion of enrolment. However, they can change the discipline or subject before the enrolment or registration. Henceforth a student must continue to study the subjects selected till the completion of the degree course.

1.4.2. Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/ new programmes?

Yes, the college has the feedback mechanism. IQAC initiated it from 2013. The feedback so obtained from different stakeholders of higher education are analysed by the Teacher-in-Charge and later discussed in IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell). The positive aspects as well as the negative aspects are taken into consideration in academic, administrative and financial reforms.

The college obtains feedback from all the stakeholders as well as the academic peers:

a) Students :

- Feedback is obtained from the students of all three years regarding the performance of teachers, learning process, infrastructure and curriculum in a structured format comprising of a standard questionnaire.
- Grievance/ suggestion box is provided by the college to gather and address the various problems of the students. The Grievance Redressal Cell was established in accordance with NAAC recommendations to monitor this process.

b) Alumni:

- Though there is a facebook page for the ex-students, they often post some comments to the post for the good sake of the college.

c) Employers / Industries:

- There are no such options for the college.

d) **Community:**

- The college does not have a parents' association. However, representatives of various communities to which the students belong are present in the **Governing Body** and actively involved in decision-making. However, parents are welcome to give their suggestions and feedback.

e) **Academic Peers:**

- The academic peers who are involved in evaluating the answer scripts and conducting practical exams give their feedback. College also maintains a separate **Visitors' Register** to record their suggestions and feedback.
- Based on the feedback received from various sources the re-designing of the curriculum including re-arrangement of classes in the Routine and Facilities in the Library.
- Considerations also made for Canteen and Toilets for the students.
- Revisions of classes also made available for the students.

1.4.3. How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/Programmes?

The college introduces 01 (one) course namely B.Sc. (Pure) by introducing Mathematics and Physics as new subjects. The growing demand for Mathematics for already existing subjects like Economics, Geography and Chemistry are the main issues behind introducing this course.

2.1. Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1. How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college ensures wide publicity in the admission process through

- active website
- the Annual Prospectus
- On-line application procedure has been started from 2015-16 for all.

Transparency in the admission process is ensured by preparing the merit list, based on the Government norms and displaying the forms nos. of selected candidates on the college website and college notice board.

2.1.2. Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by the state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the institution.

The college uses the admission rules set up by the Government of West Bengal and forwarded by the Sidho-Kanho-Birsha University admission procedure for all UG courses.

- The selected candidates are then called for an interaction seems like counseling, which is conducted by the representatives of admission sub-committee for various departments.
- Both genders are given equal opportunities.
- The reservation policy of the Government of West Bengal is adopted to ensure equity to all [SC = 23%, ST= 07%, OBC-A = 5% and OBC-B = 10%].
- Special Quota exists for the differently-abled, defence personnel, sportspersons of state and national /international stature.

2.1.3. Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a composition with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

For General Course in B.A. and B.Sc. minimum marks is 30% in Higher Secondary (10+2) examination, but for Honours course minimum marks is 45%. For different subjects, respective departments set the criteria for admission compare to other college. Though for few subjects like Sociology (Hons) and Economics (Hons) students may apply for admission who did not read these subjects in the H.S. level.

2.1.4. Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Not in such manner, but college periodically review the results of Class Test, Assessment Test and Central Test examination taken for judging the improvement of the students. On the basis of these students are promoted into next classes.

2.1.5. Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase / improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate / reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion:

a) Disadvantaged community (SC/ST/ OBC)

- The college has adopted the reservation policy of the Government of West Bengal is adopted to ensure equity to all [SC = 23%, ST= 07%, OBC-A = 5% and OBC-B = 10%].

b) Women

- The college does not practice any discrimination on the basis of gender. Equal opportunities are given to both genders.
- In some disciplines girls outnumber boys.

c) Differently- abled

- Differently-abled students are given due consideration in the admission process as per the rules of the Government of West Bengal.

d) Economically weaker sections

- For the students belonging to the economically weaker sections of the society the college introduced free ship. It is 100% for students coming from BPL families and up to 50% for others.

- In the last five years, the college has given the free ship up to the tune of Rs. 4,20,115/- (Four lakhs twenty thousand one hundred and fifteen only) to more than 800 students.

f) Minority Community

- In the last five years, the college has disbursed govt. scholarship like Kanyashree and Caste and Minority of Rs. 15,42,460=00 (Fifteen lakh forty two thousand four hundred and sixty only) to 2245 students.

g) Athletes and sports persons

- The college believes in the all-round development of students through a proper blend of sports and academics. It admits sportspersons of state and national /international stature which in turn inspires the other students to engage in sports.
- Preference is given to those sports which are played in the college.

- It is a trend here to admit more students to beyond our exact numbers of intake capacity for most of the years. Therefore in all subjects except honours courses the number of admitted is more than its original intake.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1. How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college is sensitive to the needs of differently-abled students.

- For this purpose it has already started the procedures for the construction of a ramp so as to enable such students to move around all floors.
- Manual help is extended whenever they are in need.

2.2.2. Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

- Before the commencement of the teaching programme the students attend an Orientation Programme, in which they are informed about the traditions and objectives of the college.
- Orientation programmes are also organized at the departmental level (to inform the students about the curriculum, examination pattern, general discipline and exam patterns).
- Students' needs and cognitive skills are assessed through interactions during the classes.

2.2.3. What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.)

Students coming from disadvantaged and rural communities face learning difficulties especially due to their lack of communicative skills. A large number of students come from vernacular schools.

- The college has tried exclusively to make the students more proficient in each subject through its teaching-learning procedures.

- Remedial classes are conducted by the various departments.
- Special coaching classes are conducted during vacations for the benefit of slow learners.
- Personal guidance by the faculty at all times helps the students to overcome their problems.
- To facilitate better understanding of course content bilingual method of teaching is adopted where necessary.

The college attempts to bridge the gap between students of rural and urban backgrounds through the following measures:

- Tutorials
- Counseling

There are options for tutorial classes which are arranged by the respective departments for providing help to disadvantaged learners in conventional courses and it is placed in master routine. Tutorial classes are conducted periodically and as per need of the students. Each session lasts for 45 minutes.

2.2.4. How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college has 02 (two) NSS wings for students through which environment related issues, gender issues and inclusion of every wings of the society to the mainstream is discussed and practised. NSS also adopted two villages (namely Rangiladi and Kartikganj) and student regularly attended their problems.

2.2.5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- An orientation programme for the students is held at the commencement of each academic year. The students are informed about the objectives of the institution as well as emerging trends in education and employment.
- Counseling is given by the faculty and HOD at the beginning of the course to motivate the slow learners to work hard, in order to get along with the other students.

The slow learners are provided additional help by:

- Motivating and encouraging the student
- Taking special care to clarify the doubts
- Arranging an interface with advanced learners

Facilities for advanced learners:

- Helping them to select advanced topics during seminars and projects.
- Sending them to other institutions of higher learning for more practical exposure.

Although there is no provision for counseling for each class or group, the college does make an effort to provide guidance to the students:

- Weaker students and slow learners are identified and appropriate advice and guidance is given to them.
- The dedicated faculty of the college are constantly encouraging and motivating the students to perform better through classroom activities.
- The college has deputed a faculty to counsel the students on various personal and other problems faced by them.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1. How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedule? (Academic Calendar, Teaching Plan, Evaluation Blue Print, etc.)

The academic progress is monitored collectively by the respective departments in the following ways:

- Attendance
- Classroom interaction
- Assignments/ group discussions
- Seminars and quizzes
- Continuous internal assessment
- Test Exam Result and Final Result
- Project work
- A monthly academic calendar is planned/ prepared prior to the commencement of each academic year by the Teacher-in-Charge in consultation with some senior faculty members.
- The academic calendar is prepared so that teachers and students have prior information about the commencement of classes, number of working days, holidays and tentative dates for assessment test, test Examinations and final examinations.

2.3.2. How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC is inspect and advised all the departments for improvements of qualitative and student friendly teaching-learning education. The lecture method is predominantly used in all courses, providing sufficient time for interaction. However, there is provision for the use of audio-visual aids for some subjects. There is also a plan for one of the rooms to be equipped with multi-media projectors for the same. In addition to classroom interactions, following are the other methods of learning experiences provided to the students:

- Seminars/ workshops
- Project work
- Field work

2.3.3. How is 'learning' made student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The learning is made student-centric by the following methods:

- Providing text books and reference books for self-study.
- Advance information about topics to be taught in the next class so that the students can come prepared for active discussion with teachers.
- Student seminars, and field trips.
- Practicals and project work.
- Library, internet facility and laboratories for value addition
- Availability of learning resources (CDs and DVDs).

All the above enable the students to acquire competency in various subjects on their own.

2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Department uses seminar classes to nurture critical thinking on regular basis. Thus there is departmental competition of wall magazine through which students can show their creativities. There is also a library class for all the subjects in time-table to support them and make them user friendly with different books and journals which may be a life-long experience.

2.3.5. What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg. Virtual laboratories, e-learning – resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The use of modern teaching aids is always a priority for the college. Efforts are made to maximise the use of such aids to improve the learning experience by the following means:

- Computers with internet facility for all students (from UGC-NRC scheme)
- Use of multi-media projectors
- Use of power point presentation
- Online admission procedure
- Information through college website and mobile

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- The various departments organize national-level seminars and workshops using UGC funds.
- Departmental seminars and workshops also organized infrequent basis by almost all the departments using college funds.
- Teachers are engaged themselves by presenting papers in regional, national and international seminar/workshop/conferences.

2.3.7. Details (process and the number of students / benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

- Teachers are responsible enough to take care of the students. They also provided moral support to each and every student during class hours and beyond that.
- Counseling also made whenever necessary. During admission, teachers helped them to choose the core subjects.
- There is also a Grievance Cell and Anti-Ragging Cell to monitoring psycho-social support.

2.3.8. Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Teachers are encouraged to participate in UGC-sponsored Orientation Courses and Refresher Courses and also take active participation in seminars and workshops. They used various teaching-learning methods which they learned from those courses are as follows:

- Lecture method
- Interactive method
- Experimental learning (through practicals)
- Seminars/ workshops
- Assignments
- Project work/ field trip

2.3.9. How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college library has a good collection of books and journals:

- Students are allowed to take two books at a time: one for home use and another is for library reading. Though they may provide extra books and journals through subject teachers whenever necessary.
- The central as well as the departmental libraries are continuously being upgraded and replenished with new books.
- Books related to emerging topics and modern trends are given due importance while purchasing new books.
- The college also subscribes to many journals of national and international repute.
- 28 Journals and 13 magazines are also available for the students in the reading section.

2.3.10. Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, there are time shortages for Part III students. Due to unavailability of normal session of twelve months into the academic calendar provided by the University, college sometimes can't complete the syllabus. From teacher's perspective, IQAC requested to engage extra teachers to overcome from these situations and sometimes tutorial classes also arrange for the same.

Teachers' Council frequently meets with teachers regarding the progress of the curricula. Then there is IQAC through which every department has to submit the lesson plan, half-way scrutiny of syllabus and evaluation of all types of tests taken by the teachers.

- a) Whole time Faculty members are appointed in the following procedures:
- The Posts are created from Higher Education Council, Government of West Bengal.
 - Send it to BCWD, Government of West Bengal for authentication of Roaster of Appointment (ROA).
 - Send it a requisition to the West Bengal College Service Commission.
 - Following UGC qualification norms WBCSC send the names of candidates.
 - College Governing Body makes an Appointment Letter on the basis of recommendations of Names and sends it to the candidate.
 - The candidates are called for joining the post.
- b) Part-time, Contractual and Guest Faculty members are selected through a well-defined procedure.
- The vacancies are advertised in local and national newspapers.
 - UGC qualification norms are followed while making appointments.
 - The screened candidates are called for an interview.
 - The interview board is comprised of the Teacher-in-Charge / Nominees, one external subject expert recommended by the affiliated university and two internal subject experts (including HOD and senior most faculty of the department).

Based on the performance in the interview a panel is prepared.

- The selected candidate is appointed as per category of posts.
- The GB approves and confirms his/her appointment.
- The college forwards the appointment for concurrence from the Government of West Bengal and to the University.

- In-service training:** Two in-service training for teachers was permitted to teachers during the last five years.
- Organizing National / International Conferences:** During the last five years conferences/seminars were organized in the college, by different departments to comply with NAAC recommendations.

The college has a mechanism about informing evaluation process to students and faculty through academic calendar and prospectus. All the departments also provide this information through notice board.

- A Performa for feedback is circulated among all three years UG students to evaluate the performance of the teachers.
- Evaluation of teachers is also done by the Teacher-in-Charge with the help of IQAC.

2.5.2. What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The college has a mechanism for obtaining feedback from the students in the following manner which helps to improve the academic endeavor:

- A Performa for feedback is circulated among all three years UG students to evaluate the performance of the teachers.
- The students evaluate the teachers on performance in teaching, use of teaching aids, punctuality, and completion of syllabus, knowledge input, motivation and other aspects of teaching-learning process.
- The feedback obtained is analyzed by the Coordinator of IQAC and Teacher-in-Charge to find out the strengths and weaknesses of the teachers.
- Adverse reports are intimated to the respective teachers with suitable suggestions for improvements.

This practice has helped the teachers to improve their overall performance.

2.5.3. How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- Self-appraisal system exists for teachers once in every year following Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) of UGC.
- Self-appraisal is mandatory while applying for promotion to higher grade or position.

2.5.4. Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

- Necessary directions are given to the teachers by the Teacher-in-Charge and IQAC to improve the quality of teaching and to undertake research work for quality publications.
- This directly or indirectly improves the achievements of the students.
- Organize and participation on seminar/workshop/conferences also positively impact on student performance.

The college has introduced the following evaluation reforms:

- 75% attendance is required for appearing in the final exam but minimum 60% attendance is required in all the years.
- He/she has to clear the carry papers along with the final exams of Part-I and Part-II only.

2.5.5. Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the student's results/achievements (programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

Academic audit of all the departments and quality assurance is carried out through IQAC:

- IQAC provides guidelines to all the departments to incorporate new components in the methods of teaching.
- IQAC also deliberates on the allocation of funds to the respective departments and up gradation of infrastructure.
- Regular class tests and assessment test has been taken up to monitor the progress the students.
- Students are awarded Full-freeship / Half-freeship on their tuition fees and offered scholarship as per their results on the said tests.

The institution monitors the performance of the students in the following ways:

- Attendance records for the years are displayed on the departmental notice boards. 75% attendance is mandatory for any student to take the final exams.
- Test exams are conducted every year and the results are displayed on the notice boards.
- The answer scripts are also shown to the students to help them to analyse their mistakes.

- Seminars held at the level of the department enable the students to make use of technology. Instant feedback is given by the faculty to make them aware of their shortcomings.
- Assignments and project work are evaluated by the teachers and necessary suggestions are given to the students.

2.5.6. Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last few years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.).

The college has taken the following measures on the recommendations of IQAC:

- Computers with latest configuration and internet facility have been provided to teachers of all the departments and it is placed in Geography Laboratory, Chemistry Laboratory and Teacher's Room.
- Use of technology has been increased in the teaching learning process.
- Preparations of questions for the internal tests, soft version of the same have been encouraged since 2014-15 academic sessions.
- Continuous internal assessment through assignments, seminar along with test evaluation.
- All the students are given a handbook in which all the information regarding vision and mission of the college, courses offered, faculty information, rules and regulations of the college, tentative dates of examinations, rules regarding promotion to the next year (Part-I to Part-II and Part-II to Part-III), and holidays are provided.

2.5.7. Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes', provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, the college has an evaluation system for students. All information regarding examinations and evaluation is communicated to the students:

- Through the college handbook given to each student at the beginning of the academic year.
- Notices, issued by the examination department to various departments are also displayed on all notice boards from time to time.
- Information regarding curriculum for the year and pattern of question paper and distribution of marks is displayed on the departmental notice boards.
- For evaluation of Final Examination Papers, all examiners are appointed by the Controller of Examinations as per the recommendations of the Board of Studies/ HOD of the University with which the College is affiliated.
- For internal examinations like Tests and Assessment Tests, Examination Sub-committee gives liberty to the department for evaluation of exam papers.

2.5.8. What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and university level?

The grievance redressal cell was established on 30.01.2013 to communicate students with their problems and academic improvements through following way:

- If a student feels that the marks awarded are not up to his/her expectation he/she may apply for review in that paper with prescribed fee within 15 days of the declaration of results.
- University does imply re-evaluation of the entire answer book on demand.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1. Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If yes, give details on how the students and staff are made aware of the these?

Being a government-aided college many courses are offered to cater to the diversified needs of the students.

- The process of admission starts immediately after the declaration of the WBCHSE/CBSE/ICSE results.
- The selection list for admission is prepared following the reservation policy of the Government of West Bengal.
- Efforts are made to complete the admission procedure by the end of June to ensure timely commencement of the academic session from July.

2.6.2. How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

- The structure of syllabus and curriculum has been set up to share knowledge to the students and do active research on the topics by faculty and students in their project.
- The number of women students has gone up considerably during the last five years, which speaks volumes of the institutions sensitiveness towards gender equality.

2.6.3. What are the measures/ initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the course offered?

- Although the college is in a minority reached area, the college caters to all sections of the society by ensuring fair representation in admissions to all.
- Students get state government jobs by achieving the degrees from the university catering from this college.
- Frequently career counseling classes have been offered from reputed companies throughout the year to give placements to the students.

College gathered student data from admission form and application for free-ship and scholarship. Teachers also have been engaging themselves to collect to student profile. Teaching Learning process has been improved through the following strategies:

- Interactive teaching sessions

- Use of OHP and LCD for some departments
- Providing internet facility for all students
- Introduction of GIS lab
- Project based learning
- Subscription of journals in the library
- Student centric learning
- Students feedback on academic and associated matters

2.6.5. How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The college ensures achievement of learning outcomes through:

- Appointment of qualified teachers (as per UGC norms) i.e. NET/SLET/PhD
- Encouragement to teachers to attend Orientation/Refresher Courses.
- In the various stream **03** teachers out of **08** have Ph.D. as their highest academic degree and **02** have M.Phil. as their highest academic degree among whole-time teachers.
- **15** staff members are actively involved in research and publication.
- In the last five years **six** teachers have got their minor research project grant from UGC Eastern Regional Office, Kolkata.

2.6.6. What is the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

a) University Initiatives:

- Continuous evaluation of a student is done through assignments, seminars and Class Tests besides project work in some departments.
- Annual Test exam answer books are shown to the students in many departments, to make them aware of their mistakes.
- The pattern of question paper is so as to test the all round knowledge of the subject.
- Examiners are provided with pattern of questions and syllabus.

b) College Initiatives:

- Availability of on-line application forms from 2015-16 session
- Posting the list of selected candidates in the college website
- Partly tech-based teaching learning methods
- Proof reading of questions to avoid errors and ambiguity.
- Feedback of the students is taken from external examiners, especially during practical exams.
- Timely publication of results of all internal tests.

3.1 Promotion of Research

No, this Kashipur College does not have any research centre, but faculty members are engaged in research work.

3.1.2. Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Yes, the college has a research committee which comprises the following members:

- a) Dr. Kshirod Chandra Mahato, Teacher-in-Charge (President), Ex-officio
- b) Dr. Arabinda Mallick, Assistant Professor in Chemistry (Convenor)
- c) Mr. Subrata Duary, Assistant Professor in Philosophy
- d) Mrs. Sumantra Chakraborty, Assistant Professor in Sociology
- e) Dr. Suvranshu Pan, IQAC Coordinator, Ex-officio

Research Committee organizes “*Pathachakra*”, a forum for presenting and discussion research articles frequently.

3.1.3. What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

The college authority is very keen to:

- Give autonomy to the principal investigator of Minor Research Projects funded by UGC.
- Release resources timely whenever it came from the granting authority.
- College also provides adequate infrastructure and human resources whenever necessary.
- Technological support also provided
- Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities.
- The college allows and encourages its faculty members enrolled in research activity to use the infrastructure such as laboratory, Library, equipments, electricity etc.
- The teachers are motivated to apply for UGC sponsored major and minor research projects, conduct conferences, seminars, workshops at the national and the state level. It also encourages the faculty members to attend the same.

3.1.4. What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

- The college has set up a GIS Lab, with 24 hrs electricity supply, at a cost of **Rs. 6,34,741** where modern research equipments are lodged.
- **06** faculty members are registered for their PhD during the last five years.
- A total sum of **Rs. 11,28,200/-** has been received by **six** faculty members from UGC for Minor Research Project during the last five years.
- As per the advise by the IQAC, the college allocates Rs. 10,000/- to the various departments to conduct Seminars/ Workshops.

3.1.5. Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (guiding student research, leading research projects, engaged in individual/ collaborative research activity, etc.).

The faculty members are encouraged to undergo any faculty improvement programme which would help them to complete their MPhil/ PhD. This continuous and constant encouragement by the college has yielded the following results.

- 06 faculty members have registered for Ph.D.
- **03** faculty members have Ph.D. as their highest degree.
- **04** faculty members have M.Phil as their highest degree.
- **02** faculty members including those with M.Phil have registered for their Ph.D. during the last five years.
- Three faculty members have registered for M.Phil.

Teachers are abiding to guide students in practical and field work also.

The college basically moves on the curriculum of the university. During workshops and seminars, experts are coming to guide students. In Part-III there is a project work in compulsory Environmental Studies paper which prioritizes the basic scientific issues of the locality.

The college encourages research by motivating the faculty members who do not possess M.Phil. / Ph.D. degree to enroll themselves and complete their thesis at the earliest.

- The college has no objection to faculty members who are eligible and willing to supervise research for doctoral thesis as per the guidelines of SKB University, Purulia.
- The college had conducted a workshop under the guidance of IQAC on “Role of Research in Higher Education” in February 2015 to encourage the faculty members to pursue research activities.
- Expert teachers often visit the college during practical examination for which students have to prepare from long before.

- There is option for such leaves, but teacher didn't still avail the leave.

- Beside this, the college provides Rs. 10,000/- to each department to conduct seminars and workshops.
- There are well equipped laboratories for Geography, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Physics, Music and Physical Education students and teachers.
- More than 20,000 books, 26 different journals and encyclopedia on almost every subject are available in the college library.
- There is an UGC-Network Resource Centre for students and teachers for internet use.

3.3.2. What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emergin areas of research?

- Research aptitude is also developed among UG students through Project Work/Seminars and Workshops. All the students of Part-III have to submit project report which is a compulsory part of their curriculum.
- In some Science subjects like Physics and Zoology project work is an essential part of the curriculum.
- The UG students are also encouraged to present a paper /topic in seminar/symposia organized at departmental level.
- The college has set up a GIS Lab to facilitate higher level research in the institution. The faculty members of the entire Geography department will have access to the infrastructure available at the centre for research activity. This centre was commissioned in 2013 with the following facilities:

- Dr. Arabinda Mallick of Department of Chemistry is actively engaged in collaborative research programme with different faculty members of different institutions like Dr. Pradipta Purkayastha, Associate Professor, IISER, Kolkata, Dr. Tapas Majumdar, Assistant Professor, University of Kalyani and with Dr. Syoji Ito, Assistant Professor, Professor Hiroshi Miyaska, Osaka University, Japan in the field of supramolecular chemistry area. The results were published in about 14 scientific International Journals of high impact.
- The college has no such association with other institutions regarding research activities, but seminars and workshops are organized with in collaborations with other colleges, universities and academic organizations like Bengal Economic Association (BEA), Jadavpur University (JU), Sidho-Kanho-Birsha University (SKBU), Bhava Atomic Research Centre (BARC), Reliance Jio etc.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1. What is the policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The college always aware about infrastructural shortages in the campus and tried to construct new class rooms / buildings to overcome the situation as there is huge pressure of student. Whenever required repairing and maintenance is done for the betterment of the students and staff of the college for smooth conducting the classes.

4.1.2. Detail the facilities available for

- a) Curricular and co-curricular activities – classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.*
- b) Extra-curricular activities – sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.*

Physical infrastructure:

The college campus occupies an area of 12.3 acres. The college has also purchased 5 acres in front of the main building for extension of entrance road of the college.

Classroom:

- At present the college has **19** classrooms out of which **08** classrooms are large in size; large classrooms can easily accommodate more than **120** students each.
- **07** classrooms are of moderate size and can accommodate up to **100** students.
- **02** classrooms are of smaller size and can accommodate up to **20** students.
- The college has **01** reading room for the students and **01** reading room for the teachers also.
- In addition to classrooms, the college has **01** audio room, **07** laboratories, and **01** computer lab.
- There is also **01** well decorated teachers' room in the college for faculty members.
- Additional classrooms are being constructed in the western side of the main building for which the college has a budget of **Rs. 30 lakhs**.

For all academic activities the college has the following facilities:

- Multi-media Projectors in classrooms
- OHP
- Loud speakers in large rooms

b) Co-curricular activities (Auditorium, Open air theatre, etc.)

For co-curricular activities the college utilizes the following space:

- 02 large Hall
- 01 large Seminar Room
- The college quadrangle is used for General Assembly
- Pandals are set up in the college premises during important college functions such as Freshers Welcome and College Social.

c) Sports (Swimming pool, indoor facilities, Gymnasium, etc.)

- The college has a football ground, which also caters to the sports activities of the college.
- In addition to it, there are one badminton court and a volleyball court.
- There is a separate common room for girls and boys student.
- There is a Physical training room with some facilities of gymnasium.

d) Laboratories

The following departments have laboratory facilities:

- Botany – 01
- Chemistry - 01
- Geography - 02
- Physics – 01
- Zoology - 01

With the construction of the fourth floor more laboratories will be added to Mathematics and Chemistry.

e) General computer education

The college promotes the general computer education in the following ways

- Computers are used for Geography and Mathematics students.
- UGC-NRC is opened for every student for computer practice with internet facility.

j) Other activities

- Water coolers on ground floor
- Students' Union office
- Placement cell Office
- Separate Room for NSS
- Separate Rooms for Music and Physical Education Departments for practice
- Separate bursar office
- UGC-NRC / IQAC Room

- The college has not made any provision of transport for either teachers or students.
- The college plans to introduce transport facility in a phased manner in the coming future.
- The college has 01 Van-rickshaw exclusively for internal purposes.

Water

- The college has one open well and three underground wells to cater to the needs of the college.
- There is also a reserver for the need of the college.

Power supply

- **02** govt. high-tension transformers, **01** generator and **01** big generator (Kirloskar) for the power needs of the college

Other facilities

- **04** halls
- **01** storerooms
- **01 GIS** lab
- **01** hostel
- **01** canteen
- **02** photocopying machines
- **01** Fax machines
- **02** aqua guards for staffs and **01** water cooler for students
- Computer in few department
- **02** landphones and **01** mobile

The college management is aware of the limitations of classrooms in the campus. It has made commendable efforts to augment the infrastructure to keep pace with new demands after the introduction of new courses.

On the basis of preparing for NAAC, the college has taken up the following initiatives during the last five years:

- Construction started a new building with **04** classrooms.

- Commenced construction of an additional floor in the main building to create more rooms for various purposes (in the Library Building).

4.1.4. How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities??

- The main library, the reading room and college offices are situated on the ground floor of the college building which makes these easily accessible for differently-able / physically challenged students.
- The college is planning for setting up a ramp for differently-abled students, which is soon going to be functional.

4.1.5. Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them:

- There is one Guard room in the campus for security personnel.
- BCWD, Government of West Bengal made a Tribal Boys Hostel in the college campus, where 40 seats have been allotted for college students.
- There is one Boys' Common Room and one Girls' Common Room in the campus with minimum recreational facilities.
- One change room for Physical Education students and faculty at the main building.

4.1.6. What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

- There is one first-aid box with basic amenities in the college for emergency purpose.
- Nearby a Block-level Government Hospital at Kashipur Kolloli Bazar 1.5 kms from the campus area.
- A private multi-facility hospital at Adra on Adra-Kashipur road within 5 kms from the college campus.

4.1.7. - There is separate room for IQAC at the 1st floor of Library Building.
- There is one well-equipped Canteen for students at the northern boundary of the college campus.
- There also exist Grievance and Anti-Ragging Cell, Women's Cell and Career Counseling Cell but so separate room is provided to them due to lack of class rooms.
- There is a good quality sports-field for sports and recreational purpose of the students and faculty.
- There is also beautiful forestry around the college buildings maintained by the college authority.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

- Yes, the college has a Library sub-committee. It is framed from Teachers' Council and recommended by the Governing Body. This committee comprises:

The college makes the following provisions for the purchase of books, journals and other reading materials:

- Rs. 25,000=00 is allocated to each department every year for the purchase of books, journals and other reading materials.
- The UGC grants, whenever received for the purchase of books are optimally utilized.
- Altogether a total sum of **Rs. 22,85,106/-** was utilized for the purchase of books during the last five years.

4.2.2. Provide details of the following:

The college library is kept open on all working days, including examination days between 10 am and 04 pm.

- Total area of the library is 5000 sq. fts. and it consists 03 rooms.
- Total seating capacity is 60 (attached desk-bench)
- All services are available in the library such as book transactions, reference service, periodicals, etc.
- The library has a large reading room, which can accommodate 75 students at a time.
- The reading room is open on all working days.
- A separate enclosure for magazines and periodicals has been constructed.
- Sufficient number of library staff is available to maintain the resources in the library.
- All the functions of the library are catalogued, which ensures effective services.
- The central library has subject specific and general books.
- Separate book racks are available for each subject.

- The library does have an advisory committee. Purchases are made on the recommendations of the respective departments and final approval of the Library Sub-Committee and Teacher-in-Charge.
- The college students are motivated to make optimal use of the books and journals available in the library.
- At the commencement of each year of classes the dedicated faculty members counsel the students on the resources available in the departmental as well as central library.
- New arrivals are displayed in the display section of the central library.
- There is a regular Library Classes for each departments and scheduled in the master routine.
- Circulation of books is ensured by lending books for specified durations.
- A separate enclosure has been made for the display of magazines and periodicals.
- Encyclopedia has been made available.
- Library is completely catalogued.
- Open rack has been placed in place of closed almirah.
- Faculty members may borrow necessary books as per need.
- Information regarding new arrivals is displayed.
- Magazines and periodicals are kept in a separate enclosure.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

The college has extended computer facility to the faculty and students. The college has facilitates with internet connections and serve this through a server using LAN to the all sections and net facility is available 24x7.

- The office of the Teacher-in-Charge has **one** computer with internet facility.
- Teachers' Room is equipped with three computers with internet connections in two computers.

- Department of Geography and Chemistry are equipped with **08** and **01** computers respectively and internet facility for both faculty and students.
- The UGC-NRC Room has **06** computers with internet facility. Students and teachers can use this centre for their academic purposes.
- Office also decorated with **06** computers with internet facilities.
- There is also **one** computer for the Bursar in the Meeting Room.
- **02** computers installed in the corner section of the Meeting Room as server.
- Beside there is also **02** Laptops used for official and academic purpose.
- There is one computer at the IQAC Room at Library Building.

- BSNL net connection is there (10 users) for teachers and students.
- One Reliance and one Vodaphone Datacard are there with net connections.
- College has a plan to introduce wi-fi in the campus with a collaborative mode with Reliance Jio very soon.

- The college has a total of **22** computers and **02** laptops in the college.

The college made all possible efforts to increase computer awareness and motivated the faculty to use this resource in the teaching-learning process. The following steps were taken in this regard:

- Multimedia projectors have been used during seminars and workshops. Students are involved themselves for departmental seminars by using projectors.
- OHP is also used as teaching aid for some classes.
- In addition to this, the faculties of various departments are always ready to guide and help the students when in need.

The college does not provide transport facility for students and faculty, so it does not make any budgetary allocation for the same.

The budget is prepared keeping in mind the annual expansion plans and allocation of funds to the various departments for maintenance and improvement of infrastructure. All financial matters are discussed and ratified as per need by the Governing Body.

The college has appointed the following for maintenance and repair as per requirements:

- **02** plumbers for general maintenance

- In addition to these the college also utilizes the services of workers on daily basis

The infrastructure is used optimally used in the following ways:

- Class timings are scheduled in such a manner that there is minimum problem for room availability to conduct the classes.
- Offices and library are located in the ground and first floor, which does not disturb the conduct of classes on the upper floors of the college.
- Silent generator (Kirlosker) has been installed for power back up which allows for classes to be held even after sunset and in the case of power outages.
- Two photocopying machines are exists in the campus.
- The college has collaborated with State Bank of India for an extension counter of admission through deposition of fees by the students.
- Salary accounts of the teachers are also maintained in another branch of SBI for minimum inconvenience to them.
- Canteen is located at the middle of the college campus.
- 01 boy hostel is located in the campus.

- The college has appointed one technician (need based) to maintain the computer and network facilities such as the server, the leased line for internet, and the department computers.

- The college has **02** security personnel who work in shifts round the clock.

Yes, the college provides financial aid to students in the form of free ships and scholarships:

- In 2014-15, the college provided freeship to almost 150 students.
- In 2013-14, the college provided freeship to 56 students (Full Freeship to 6 and Half Freeship to 50 students) in the tune of Rs. 40,115/-.
- The college also arranged the government scholarships (e.g. Chief Minister Scholarship, Kanyashree, Caste Scholarship, Minority Scholarship etc.) for 2245 students during last four years.
- The college provides four Scholarships (namely Maharaja Sankari Prasad SingDeo Memorial Scholarship for PG Students, Sampat Roy Memorial Scholarship I, II and III for Part-I, Part-II and Part-III students respectively).
- There is also provision for Vivekananda Merit Scholarship and B.M. Jalan Scholarship for students.

5.1.3. What percentage of students receives financial assistance from state government, central government and other national agencies?

- Almost 100 per cent female student of the college receives Kanyashree (a Government of West Bengal's Scholarship for unmarried students).
- 3% of the students received Chief Minister Merit Scholarship and Vivekananda Merit Scholarship from college (both Government).
- Private agencies like BM Jalan Scholarship also available for college students and 2 -3 students from each year should make a cut for it.

- There is tutorial class for slow learners.
- Students do participates in state and national level sports from this college.

- College uniform is provided to all students' participated and well-placed in college annual sports.
- Brotochary Camp is organized every year to make good human being with morality.

- As counseling is a day-to-day activity all the faculty members are involved in academic and personal counseling from time to time. Students are encouraged to approach the faculty members whenever they are in need of guidance and counseling regarding higher studies, placement opportunities, preparation for competitive examinations as well as the problems faced by them in the college regarding academics and other activities.
- The college does not have an employment cell to look after self-employment. However, the Career Counseling Cell provides employment opportunities to students.
- Some reputed company visited and provide campus seminar in the last four years are: a) Brainware, b) Webel Informatics Ltd., c) WB-NET, d) Carriograph, e) Reliance Jio, f) NIIT etc.

Yes, the college has Students’ Welfare and Grievance Redressal Cell which consists of the teaching and non-teaching staffs with the Teacher-in-Charge as its Chairman and IQAC Convener is a honorary member.

- No, the college does not have a cell to prevent Sexual Harassment. The college takes utmost care that cases of sexual harassment do not occur in the college campus. In case any such incident is reported, the Teacher-in-Charge, after verifying its authenticity, takes necessary disciplinary action in consultation with the senior faculty members. So far no such cases have been reported.

A **Legal Awareness Camp** was organized on September 29, 2014. Open discussion was made by two eminent Judges of Raghunathpur Sub-divisional Court and teachers, office staffs and students. The focus of the camp was on “Legal Advice for Problems in Local and Daily Life”. About 100 participants from different disciplines participated in the camp.

Yes, there is an Anti-ragging committee which comprises teachers, office staff, students, local administration, and a member from local police station. Still now there is no instance of ragging is reported.

The college provides the following welfare schemes for the students:

- The college provides student freeships to needy students. In the last five years the college disbursed a sum of Rs. 2,20,115/-.
- The college also arranged for government scholarships for the students.
- The college is sensitive to the needs of differently-abled students. For this purpose it has already planned to the construction of ramp so as to enable such students to move around all floors. Manual help is extended whenever they are in need.
- The college has introduced class tests and assessment test since 2009 to facilitate better learning and arrange of library classes to increase the interests of text books among the students.
- Students now register themselves for a period of six years in which they have to complete 3year degree course.
- Environmental Studies as subsidiary paper is offered to all the students irrespective of stream.
- Infrastructure is being continuously upgraded to provide better facilities to both faculty and students.
- The college does not provide any health care facility on the campus but the Kashipur Block Hospital is situated just 1.5 km away from the college which helps out in case of any emergency.
- The college has not yet been able to start group insurance scheme for the students.

The institution is managed by **College Governing Body**, a society registered under Society Registration Act XXI of 1860, headed by the Teacher-in-Charge who is the head of the organization. The Teacher-in-Charge is the Secretary of the Governing Body of the college. He is also the academic head of the college and is involved in co-ordinating all the functions associated with the post.

- Efficient and effective leadership is carried out through de-centralization in the form of setting up of various policy making bodies such as the Governing Body, IQAC, Finance Committee, Teachers' Council, Planning Board, Admission Committee, Examination Committee, Cultural Committee, Purchase Committee, Construction Committee, Anti-Ragging Committee, Placement and Career Counseling Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Freshship and Scholarship Committee, and Academic Calendar and Time-Table Committee.

- These committees are comprised of faculty members, who meet periodically and review the matters concerning their activities.
- The existence of such consultative boards and the active participation of the staff assist the Teacher-in-Charge in carrying out the duties of the head of the institution.
- The Teacher-in-Charge is both the academic as well as the administrative head of the institution. He provides valuable guidance in planning, organising and execution of all academic activities.
- He maintains a cordial relationship with the staff and all the stakeholders of higher education.
- He is responsible for admission of students, finance, conduct of various committee meetings, students' welfare, discipline and all regular activities of the college.
- The Teacher-in-Charge is assisted by Bursar, Coordinator of IQAC, the heads of all the departments and other faculty members in taking administrative and academic decisions. The decisions on the curriculum of various courses are taken care of by the Teachers' Council of the college.
- The Teacher-in-Charge has a key role as he is the Member Secretary of the Governing Body, the Chairperson of the Teachers' Council, EX-Officio member of the Finance Committee and ex-officio member of all sub-committees.

- Matters related to finance are addressed by the finance committee.

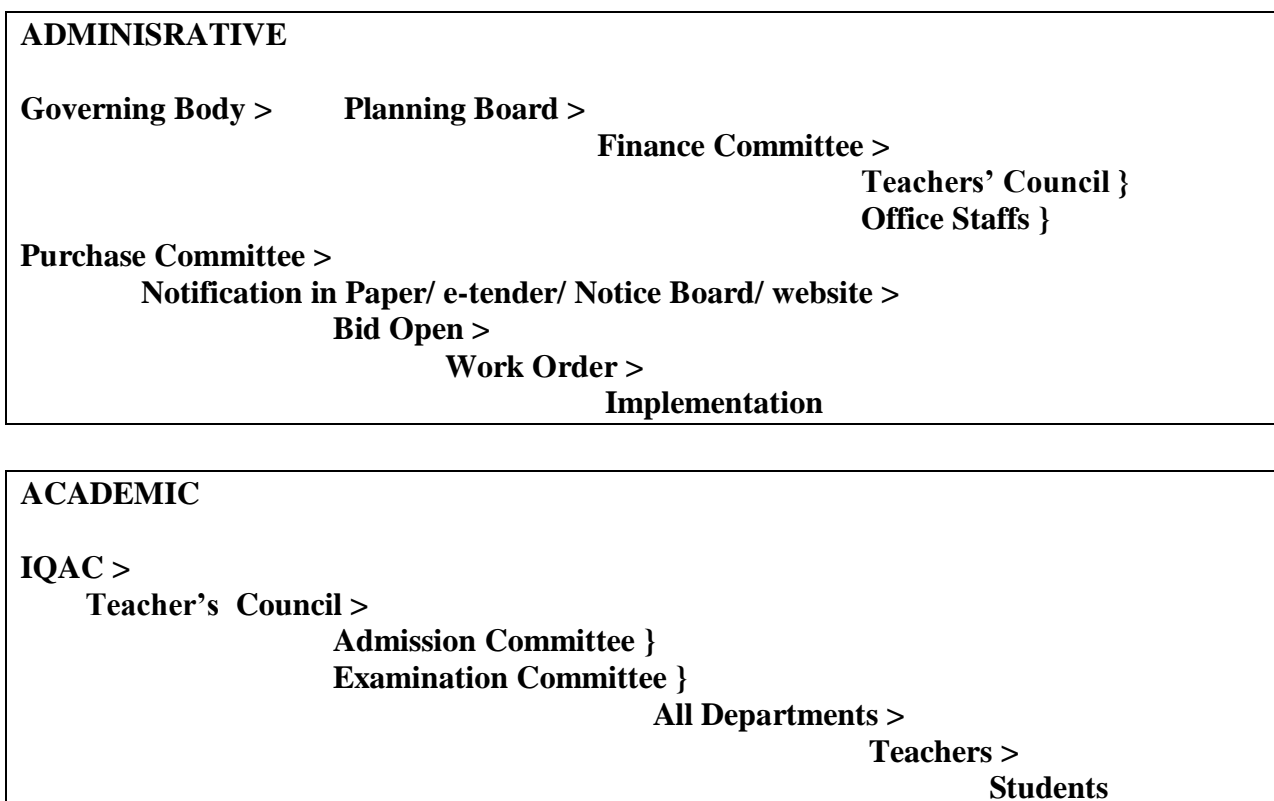

- The college prepares, in advance, its Prospectus and own Academic Calendar with slight modifications from the academic calendar of the parent university. The modifications relate to the scheduling of vacations, prospective dates of internal examinations and commencement of classes.
- All the departments revamp the curricula on the basis of the emerging trends and feedback from stakeholders and place it before the Teachers' Council, comprised of internal and external academicians and stakeholders, for final approval and implementation.
- IQAC is responsible for ensuring quality in all academic activities which leads to the overall development of the institution.
- There is no provision for autonomy right now.

6.3.1. What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The college did not conduct any staff development programme during the last five years.

- The teaching staff is encouraged to attend orientation and refresher courses for self-development.
- The seminars/ conferences/ workshops etc. conducted by the various departments facilitate the staff to acquire more knowledge in their fields.
- Training of COSA software and e-pradan for non-teaching staff was organized.

6.3.2. What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

College always adopted strategies for the faculty:

- Encouraging teachers to participate in Refresher Courses, Orientation Programme, Faculty Recharge Programme, Short-term training Courses.
- Faculty also organized Departmental Seminar, National Seminar/ Workshops and organized Conferences of renowned societies and associations.
- The departments of Geography and Chemistry are provided with computers with internet facility so as to enrich the teaching staff.
- LCD and other audio-visual packages are made available so as to enrich teaching-learning programme.
- One classroom is planning to equip with multi-media projectors and the college aims at providing at least one multi-media room on each floor.
- Seminar Room, Hall – I and Hall - II are planning to equip with multi-media projectors for conferences/ symposium.
- The GIS Lab is established to enrich students and teachers of Geography.

6.3.3. Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- For teaching staff, CAS (Career Advancement Scheme) through PBAS (Performance Based Appraisal System) with minimum API (Academic Performance Indicator) is an appraisal system which verified by IQAC Convener at the beginning and the finalized it by the Subject Expert from University and Expert from Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal.
- Teachers also encourage taking part in extra-curricular activities in sports and cultural programmes to cop up with students.
- The college appraises the performance of non-teaching staff (general administration) through the respective office superintendents.
- The administrative staff of the various sub-committees is monitored by the respective department.
- The departmental non-teaching staff is regulated by the respective HODs.

The Teacher-in-Charge is the final authority in all respects.

6.3.4. What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

- The college follows a self-appraisal method of faculty through specific structural format issued by the parent university for CAS.
- Before applying for any promotion the faculty members need to fill up the self-appraisal report.
- The self-appraisal report reflects the teaching, research and other credentials of a faculty member.
- The self-appraisal report is analyzed by IQAC and by a screening committee chaired by the Teacher-in-Charge of the college before considering the candidature for promotion.

The college cannot promote a teacher from Assistant Professor (Stage I – Stage II – Stage III) – Associate Professor, since all these matters are considered by the parent university and Ministry of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal.

- After the screening for CAS is over, the management is decided the performance of the teachers and take necessary steps to promote or demote the teachers and sent the matters to the respective higher authority in the Government of West Bengal.
- Communications also made on the basis of the decisions at GB.

6.3.5. What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

- Government allocates DA for teachers and Non teaching staffs periodically.
- There is also a provision for Medical Allowances and House Rent Allowances for staffs.
- Leave encashment provision is there for more than 300 Earned leaves.

There is no such measures as it is Government aided college and run through grant-in-aid.

Efforts for Resource Mobilization:

The Government of West Bengal disburses the salaries of those posts sanctioned with finance for both teaching and non-teaching staff. The fees collected from the students, which include staff fund and college fund, help the college to mobilize resources.

- The college uses these funds to pay the salaries of the teaching and non-teaching staff on the first week of every month.
- The college receives the salaries of 23 teaching staff and 12 non-teaching staff from the govt. of West Bengal periodically, which helps to replenish the depleted funds.
- Resources are also mobilized by letting out space for various competitive exams.
- The college receives financial help from UGC frequently and maintained its infrastructural needs, purchase of books and equipments.

- The individual departments are monitored by the respective Department-in-Charges (anything else).
- The administrative offices are monitored by the Teacher-in-Charge.
- The examination office is monitored by the Examination Centre Committee and Coordinator of Examinations.
- The Teacher-in-Charge takes the final decision on all the matters related to the college.
- The Teachers' Council exists as an advisory body on academic affairs.

Due to the effective coordination of the various committees the college is able to conduct successfully various functions such as Student's Farewell and College Social Day.

- The Teacher-in-Charge and the Coordinator of IQAC are available during office hours to meet with parents, staff members and students on all working days.
- Some duties are assigned to the Head Clerk such as issuing of Identity Cards, Library Cards and Character Certificate, and College Leaving Certificate and also taking care of the discipline of the campus.
- The Head Clerk is also responsible for catering to the day-to-day needs of the departments and students.
- The dedicated and committed faculty members contribute much to the effective governance informally by their dedication on all days.
- The faculty members work hard to maintain strict discipline in the college.
- All the faculty members are actively involved in all the functions of the college.

The college has an organizational structure in which the Teacher-in-Charge is the head of the organization. Other administrative post is of the Bursar.

- Internet facility has been made available to all the faculty and students.
- Extra classes can be arranged by the faculty, if they feel so.
- Teaching Staff members are motivated to take up UGC Research Projects (major and minor) and publish research articles.

Feedback Mechanism:

Recently we have started taking feedback from the students about the infrastructural facilities, administrative support, nature of academic session etc. Students of each department are expected to do so for all the teachers concerned with their class. Besides, informal interaction between the students and the Class Teachers /Teacher-in-Charge about issues pertaining to teaching quality is also encouraged.

Computerization of Administrative Section:

Along with the orthodox system of working, the college administrative section is being computerized. From the academic session 2015-16, admission of students is being done online; payment of salary of the teaching and non-teaching staff is also being done through internet banking. The administrative staffs have been given formal training to understand the technicalities pertaining to working on the technology.

Computerization of Library:

The library is not computerised.

Zero-Balance Accounts:

The college has facilitated its staff as well as the other internal stakeholders, i.e. the students with providing them the facility to maintain a zero balance bank account in the State Bank of India, Raghunathpur branch and United Bank of India, Kashipur respectively. Criterion-wise Evaluation Report

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

Established in 2000, **Kashipur Michael Madhusudan Mahavidyalaya, Purulia, West Bengal** is a undergraduate college run by the Governing Body as per Statute of the Sidho-Kanho-Birsha University, Purulia. Its mission is to train young men and women to become good citizens of the country, develop global competencies and the skills necessary for being successful in life.

The college is a co-educational day college. The college offers six undergraduate Honours programmes in Arts category, General courses in sixteen subjects including five Science subjects. There are also three-year general courses in Physical Education. The college is committed to providing an environment fostering research. In the last five years the college has spent a sum of Rs.1,69,47,421/- on procuring new apparatus and equipments. It has also set up a Library Building at a cost of about twenty-five lakhs. In addition, the Geography Department has a separate GIS Laboratory set up at a cost of about six lakhs. The college also has a Research-cum-Workshop Centre named “Pathachakra” devoted entirely on analytical and group discussion in various subjects of which teachers and students are involved in various projects.

The college also has NSS and applied for NCC. There is also Medicinal Plant Garden maintained by the Botany Department and Physical Fitness Camp Room in the Department of Physical Education. Since Purulia District of West Bengal is an economically and socially underdeveloped region, the college gives preference in admission to marginalized groups such as Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and other marginalized groups.

To keep the curricula up to date and relevant to the needs of society, periodic revisions are made in the curricula of different subjects portrayed in Routines which includes Library Classes for different subjects on regular basis. Project work, field trips and on-the-job training are compulsory components of various programmes. The college also invites experts from various fields as Key Speakers and Analyst in various Seminar/Workshop organized by different departments. Facilities for providing net facilities to students through UGC-NRC exist in the college. Bengali and English Languages are compulsory for all students of Part-I and Environmental Studies are mandatory for all the students of Part-III. To help the slow and disadvantaged learners, the college arranges tutorial classes. There is a feed-back mechanism, which has recently introduced for all students of the colleges.

Criterion II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) that meets periodically to discuss the various issues regarding teaching-learning and evaluation. The process of admitting students to various programme is transparent. Students are admitted on the basis of merits only following SKB University guidelines and also on the basis of instructions by the West Bengal Higher Education Council. It is a co-educational institution, and in some disciplines the number of girls exceeds that of boys. For differently-abled students also, there is a reservation policy. Full and Half Free studentship are given to economically marginalized students and a Scholarship is also given to ongoing and ex-students for their academic endeavour.

For a well-rounded development of students, the college offers a proper blend of academics and sports. Before the commencement of various programmes, there is an orientation programme in which the students are made aware of the traditions and objectives of the college. The college is sensitive to the needs of disadvantaged students for whom remedial classes, counseling and special classes during vacations are organized.

The academic progress of a student is carefully and continuously monitored. Great emphasis is laid on assignments and continuous internal evaluation. The college lays great stress on attendance. The college prepares both monthly and annual academic calendars. The teaching-learning method is increasingly becoming student-centred. In accordance with this all departments have a regular class at library and there is free internet access provided to students so that they can use it for self-study. Each department has a well-stocked library from which students borrow books regularly.

The college has a total of 54 [Permanent Whole Time Teachers = 08, Permanent Contractual Teachers =02, Permanent Part Time Teachers = 15 and Guest Teachers = 29] faculty members, of which 40 are male and 14 female. There are three faculty members with Ph.D. and four with M. Phil. 15 out of 54 teachers have qualified UGC- CSIR, NET/SLET examinations which come to 33% of the total strength. Ten teachers are currently registered for their Ph.D. Approximately 42% of the faculty members have participated in workshops/ seminars/ conferences and 17% of the teaching staff have presented their papers. There is also a self-appraisal system for teachers in place.

The schedule for examinations is published by the Examination Sub-Committee well in advance. The examination papers are coded. There is also class test for all three years,

assessment test for part-I students only, test examinations for all three years and University conducted Part-I, Part-II and Part-III examinations hosted by our college affiliated to SKBU, Purulia and previously under the University of Burdwan up to 2011. Though some of our students are still appearing for Part-III examinations as back candidates under BU (only 2% of students appeared in the final examinations), maximum numbers (almost 98%) of the students are appearing under the guidance of SKBU from our college.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

A number of members of the faculty have been engaged themselves in research work. Two minor research projects of the UGC have been received by the faculty of the college in last year and seven has been submitted to the UGC with full report in last five years. IQAC has encouraged all the departments to go for Seminars and Workshop. Following this five departments have submitted proposals to the ERO-UGC and the Department of Physical Education has already made it possible to organize the Two-day Seminar in April 2015. College also allocate fund to conduct seminars, conferences and workshops. IQAC and the Department of Bengali had conducted a Workshop each in March 2015. In the last five years, five national seminars, one state-level seminar and two workshops have been conducted.

In order to encourage research, during the last five years the college has spent **Rs. 24,39,806/-** on the purchase of books, journals, equipments and other infrastructural facilities. Sixteen research journals are available in the college library for the use of students and researchers. The faculty members of all the science departments and Geography department have access to the infrastructure available at the centre. Two halls are equipped with microphones and one Seminar room has facilities for conducting events. The college has also introduced Network Resource Centre (NRC) facility since 2014. The college has also taken an initiative to collaborate with other organizations for fostering research activities. For instance, it has signed an MoU for two years with WBUT to find out the effect of “Nationwide Environmental Gamma Radiation Monitoring using TLDs” inside the campus in 2015. College is associated with Sidho-Kanho-Birsha University, Purulia; Bankura Christian College, Bankura; Bidhan Chandra College, Asansol, Burdwan; Bengal Economic Association, Kolkata; Raghunathpur College, Purulia; Mahatma Gandhi College, Purulia; West Bengal University of Technology, Kolkata; and Bhaba Atomic Research Centre (BARC) for various researches related activities like seminar and workshop.

The faculty members have also been honoured for their work. **Dr. Suvranshu Pan**, Assistant Professor in Economics have been appointed as Joint Secretary (Publication), Bengal Economic Association and Invitee Editorial Board Member of the referred Journal, *Artha Beekshan (Journal of Bengal Economic Association)*. He has invited to various international seminars and conferences to present paper (like IIDS Seminar at Aquinas College, Colombo, Sri Lanka; USEA Conference at Seattle, USA and IEA Conference at Kunming, China). **Dr. Arabinda Mallick**, Assistant Professor in Chemistry has been invited for Post Doctoral Fellowship at Osakha University, Japan. One of the Guest Faculty of Music Department, **Sri Prasenjit Mandal** has visited America for his academic enrichment. In the last five years, eight faculty members have published a total of twenty-two research papers and articles taken together. The faculty members have also published six books during this period.

Outreach programmes are regularly organized by the college. A number of students of the college participated State and National Games held in last five years. The College has organized a Legal Awareness Camp with Judicial Judges of Raghunathpur Court. Students of the NSS have organized tree-plantation programmes, blood donation awareness camps, AIDS awareness programmes, and many other programmes of social relevance. The college promotes institution-neighbourhood network through NSS and it has an adopted village named Rangiladih.

For their excursion and field survey, students of Geography Department of this college have visited various states of the country including Kerala in 2010, Assam and Meghalaya in 2011, Orissa in 2012, Andhra Pradesh in 2013, and Tamil Nadu in 2014. Students of Science departments also went to a trip for their academic enrichment in 2015.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is sufficiently well-endowed in terms of physical infrastructure. The college campus occupies an area of 9.10 acres. At present the college has 25 classrooms including 07 laboratories out of which 05 classrooms are large in size; each can easily accommodate more than 400 students. 05 classrooms are of moderate size and can accommodate up to 120 students. 09 classrooms are of smaller size and can accommodate up to 60 students. In addition to classrooms, the college has 01 audio room, 07 laboratories, 02 computer labs, 01 meeting room and 02 libraries for the students. Additional classrooms are being constructed in the western side of the college campus for which the college has a budget of Rs. 30 lakhs. The college has a central library besides different department libraries. The bar coding of books in the library is

currently in progress. The college also has a number of labs. The college has four administrative rooms and two offices. For important functions such as annual day functions that require more covered space, special stages are made and pandals are set up in the college premises. There are other facilities such as cool and clean drinking water and wash rooms for students and the faculty. The college has a placement and counseling centre too.

The college has acquired a campus tribal hostel within the boundary maintained by the BCWD, Government of West Bengal. The college has purchased 1.5 acres of land in front side of the college main building for extension of the main entrance to the college. The college has a well maintained forestry inside the campus and a green audit also has been done by the students and teachers of the students.

The college plans to provide transport facility in future in a phased manner. So far as the power supply is concerned, the college has one government high-tension transformer, two large generators for power backup. The college has a canteen, two Xeroxes and a hostel. All the departments and the offices including the General Staff Room have aqua guard water cooler facility. For all academic activities, the college has the following facilities: multi-media projectors in classrooms, OHP, microphone facility in large rooms. The college also has its own GIS laboratory with seven computers and net connections for the students.

For encouraging the students to take part in outdoor sports, the college has a football-cum-cricket ground, one badminton court, one volley ball court, well maintained athletic field, and one physical education room. There are also three carom boards, two table tennis boards and one chess Set for the internal sports for the students and teachers. The college also has a full-time qualified physical training instructor.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

As mentioned earlier, the college has a well-equipped campus located in the western part of Kashipur block area. Our results show that on an average 65% of our students are successful in the examinations.

The college has a website which provides necessary details to the students. Applicants to various courses in the college also download application forms from the site send their applications online. Online admission procedure has been adopted by the college from this 2015-16 academic session.

In keeping with the vision of the college, which is to contribute significantly in the development of the State of West Bengal, the college always provides special assistance to students of disadvantaged groups in the form of remedial classes and counseling. In fact, counseling students is a regular activity in this college.

There is a provision of Free ship and Scholarship for the ongoing and ex-students of the college. Besides these, there is Kanyashree, Caste scholarship, Minority scholarship and Jalan Scholarships for meritorious students.

Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

The Teacher-in-Charge, the IQAC Coordinator, the various Heads of the Departments, and the Coordinators of different Sub-Committees provide effective leadership enabling the college to fulfill its twin missions of excellence in education and empowerment of the weaker sections of society. Besides the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) there are a number of committees to perform the various functions related to the college. The college also has a Teacher's council with the Teacher-in-Charge as its ex-officio President. Three senior members of the faculty represent the staff on the Governing Board of the college. The college has an alumni association called Kashipur Alumni Association and has a face book page also.

Criterion VII: Innovation and Best Practices

Over the years, the college has adopted a number of innovative practices the particulars of which are given in the detailed report. The popularity of the college is indicated by the number of applicants for different courses that is going up every year.

In the various functions of the college, the core values of NAAC are reflected. For realizing the vision of making quality assurance an integral part of the functioning of an institution of higher education, the college subjects itself to periodic self and external evaluation. It also collaborates with the stakeholders for assurance and sustenance of quality in higher education. All the five core values of NAAC, that is, national development, fostering global competencies among students, inculcating a healthy value system, promoting the use of technology and quest for excellence are sought to be promoted by the various functions of the college.

EVALUATIVE REPORTS OF THE DEPARTMENTS

a) Stream I: B.A. (Honours):

- There are eight honours courses in this college. Started from 2002 with honours in Bengali and Geography, the college leads to the district for having honours in Geography to the surroundings. Since 2005 Sociology honours had been introduced in the college which is the first in the entire district. English and History honours courses were opened in 2007 and Philosophy honours was opened in 2011. In 2015, Economics and Political Science honours were opened up for the betterment of the students.
- Results of the honours departments are among the top three position of the district.
- Students also benefitted with single window teaching-learning methodology.
- Seminar classes were introduced for the students.

b) Stream II: B.A. (General):

- There are thirteen general subjects of Arts offered to the students of which four are language subjects namely Bengali, English, Sanskrit and Santhali.
- Subjects like Economics, Sociology, Philosophy, History and Political Science are the basic humanities introduced in the college for the students.
- Geography, Music and Physical Education are the practical based general courses and seats for these subjects are limited.
- Results are up to the mark.
- Only problem is the student-teacher ratio as there is huge demands for subjects like Bengali, Sociology, History, Philosophy and Political Science.

c) Stream III: B.Sc. (Bio-Science General):

- Chemistry, Botany and Zoology are offered to the students for Bio-science course.
- Well-equipped laboratories help students to benefit from practical classes as sincere teachers are always there.
- Results are quite satisfied with small numbers of students though most of the students are coming from vocational courses.

d) Stream IV: B.A. (Pure-Science General):

- Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry comprises in this Pure-Science stream.
- Students are not admitted in large numbers in this stream as because feeder school does not provide so called science students thus supply line is always weak in nature.
- Results are moderate because students are coming from vocational courses.

Action Taken for Preparing for Accreditation of the College since 2009

- To accredit the college for the first time, the college had formed a NAAC Steering Committee on 2009 in the leadership of then Principal and a core of five Members including five teachers and one non-teaching staff.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was set up by the Governing Body in 2012 and appointed one of the Senior Teacher as Coordinator.
- Introduce Seminar Class and Library Class for the students and make it possible through a period provided in the master routine.
- Introduce new courses like Mathematics and Physics for Science General Stream and Philosophy (Honours), Physical Education and Music for Arts General courses. They also provide upward mobility to undergraduate students.
- The college has facilities for a well equipped Geographical Information System (GIS) Laboratory and Physics Laboratory for the students.
- New BSNL linkages have been taken for the Offices, Teacher's Room and Laboratories.
- To facilitate all students a UGC-Network Resource Centre (UGC-NRC) has been established.
- A Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Cell and Women Cell have been set up in the college.
- Renewal of "Pathachakra" (An internal open discussion forum for Teachers and Students) has been made available.
- Regular Career Counseling for the students has been done with the mode of inviting various prosperous firms into the college.
- Entering into the project work by WBUT with "Nationwide Environmental Gamma Radiation Monitoring using TLDS" inside the campus in 2015.

- A new Library Building (Ground + one floor) has constructed with a Seminar Hall.
- A new building (Ground floor only) is being constructed at the western side of college for new class rooms.
- A new Canteen Building (Ground floor) has been constructed for college students at the Northern side with a proposed Guest House at the first floor.
- For safety and security of the students and staffs, Boundary Wall has been made with the help of Government Funds and MP-LAD Funds.
- A newly constructed roadway from the main road (going through Southern side of the college) and internal road from old canteen building to new Library building have been prepared.
- The enrolment of girl students has steadily increased during the last five years.
- During the last five years more women faculty have been appointed which speaks volumes about the interest of the institution in fulfilling its goals.
- Women-related issues and topics have been incorporated in the curriculum for spreading greater awareness on these matters.

The overall academic ambience in the college is much better today than what it was five years ago.
